wordlists: vowels, consonants

text passage

interviews: guided and free

The PAC Lancashire Corpus

(for this study)

8 females and 1 male 23-83 years of age and DK 29 years old

recorded in late 2002 5h of recordings

340 occurrences of because

Pragmatic uses

The structure A – because B.... – so A' (Passot 2007, for Standard British English)

= submitted to addressee as potentially consensual

= elements that allow to reach consensus

= A is considered as part of shared background

Apparent time changes

- 1/ MO (83) only uses disyllabic forms
- 2/ LC (77) and MC (71) do use [kpz] but not a reduced form
- 3/ [kəz] starts appearing with PK (58)
- 4/ younger speakers have the widest range
- 5/ younger speakers have a clear preference for reduced forms

PAC data

MD1f (23 years old)

[that was strange]

because [kəz] I didn't know anybody because [ks] I'd gone to primary school in Bolton so [it was completely different]

PK1f (58 years old)

but [yoga I really like]

because [bɪˈkɒz]...it's stretching it just stretches you and I can do it you see, so [I I/ I like that,] it's not fast or, it's just nice and, slow and, yes and I like it yeah.

LC1f (77 years old)

but in a way

[I was lucky]...

because I'd been completely free since I was 39... so [I'd been able to make the most of my freedom]

Apparent time changes

1/ younger speakers have a syntactically constrained version of this structure
